The British NEWSPAPER

One of the most comprehensive, international genealogical information available, with more than 5 billion names in thousands of collections including census, vital, church, court, and immigration records.

British Newspapers Archive

Largest collection of British and Irish historical newspapers with 55 million pages dating from the 1700s to the 2000s.

Find My Past



Billions of historical records from around the world. Records in Victoria include electoral rolls. birth, death and marriage indexes, Petty Session registers, Victoria Police Gazette, Passenger lists and more.

Gale Primary Sources



Contains full runs of influential national and regional newspapers representing different political and cultural segments of British society. Includes The Times, Illustrated London News and Daily Mail.
